- never have the words of the late Archbishop of El Salvador, Oscar Romero, spoken been truer. Praise be to God for the abundance of grace, joy and life that walks through this House of Hospitality. To see and witness to the goodness of the many volunteers that profess not only in word but also in action the will of God knocks

me off my feet. I find it overwhelming the feeling that I receive when I see the face of Christ in so many. I believe the long view Archbishop Romero speaks of is what we, Catholics, profess from the depths of our souls each time we transition in Mass from the Liturgy of the Word to the Eucharist. Now there are those who curse, swear, utter every kind of offense against us that at times can lead us to loose hope and sanity; nevertheless, that same day, God came to me through the intercession of many of our volunteers, my fellow core members, and other quests offering comfort and perspective. Over the course of the next few days, I reflected on this experience

and through prayer, I received grace and understanding. I thought of the Beatitudes. Blessed are you when they insult you, persecute you, and utter every kind of evil against you because of me, rejoice for your reward will be great in heaven. God tells us that if we choose Him, and His commandments, hope and trust in Him, will we receive eternal life, but not will we walk this road without adversity and oppression. There have been many times that I have been cursed at, but only one time where I was hit. Faith may not be easy at times, but when you have saints all around you, it sure helps to step back and see God's glory all around us. This year has pushed me mentally and physically, but the experience I received is truly a gift and one that I will hold dear and cherish the rest of my life. My faith has grown tremendously and that is the greatest present I could ever receive. To make God known, loved, and served is what I have tried to do and will continue to do. And it is in giving that we receive, and what we receive is the gift of eternal life. It is my prayer that God will bless all of you for your continued support of André House.

Lessons From An Unexpected Source

Every Monday I am in charge of soupline, and I am blessed to have many dedicated volunteers who assist me weekly. It has been a joy getting to know them throughout the year, exchanging life stories, and becoming friends. I am impressed by their cheerful willingness to help week after week, and they challenge me to do my job well and with a smile. These folks tend to be older, working part-time or retired. As much as they are an inspiration, I am just as impressed with our younger volunteers - such as the local college and high school students. For many of them it is their first experience with social service and encountering people in need. Because this is often an opportunity for these young people to grow, I debrief with them at the conclusion of soupline, asking them how the dinner hour went and what they thought. One such conversation is forever ingrained in my memory.

Jonathan began volunteering at André House because, as a high school student, his mother thought it would be good for him. His initial performance wasn't impressive, though. He seemed quiet, unsure of what to do with himself, and needed guidance with tasks. As usual, I wanted to have a little reflective conversation on his service after dinner cleanup, but it consisted of me asking questions, and Jonathan giving me one-word answers. He signed up for other nights' souplines so I was able to see him a couple of times a week. The more often Jonathan volunteered, the more comfortable he became. He quickly became a self-initiated worker, recognizing what needed to be done, and completing tasks without being asked. He slowly became more and more talkative as well. Now when I see him scheduled to volunteer on my soupline, I get excited because I know I can assign him to any job and trust that he will complete it well.

One Monday, I assigned Jonathan to work in the Family Dining Room, a separate dining room for folks in wheelchairs or families with children. There, our volunteers carry trays to the tables and serve the guests much like waiters. At the end of the evening, I asked Jonathan how it went. He replied with a simple "good". I said, "There were a lot of kids tonight. That's always tough to see." Jonathan stated matter-of-factly, "Yea, I remember going to St. Vincent de Paul with my mom when I was little, so I can relate to these kids". I was blown away and didn't really know how to respond. "Well, I'm glad you're able to be on the other side of the table now," I said. Jonathan continues to volunteer regularly, multiple times a week and thoroughly enjoys the work. What was intended to be an opportunity for me to teach a high school student about homelessness turned into an unforgettable lesson for myself.

Where Are They Now?

Some may remember St. Joseph the Worker (SJW) as the tiny back office at André House that helps people get jobs. The agency, started by the André House in 1988, is standing on its own two feet these days and celebrating its 20th Anniversary! While much growth has occurred at SJW, the agency retains it single purpose mission: helping others to help themselves by gaining and maintaining permanent, sustainable employment. We are just doing it in a larger facility with a few more staff members and volunteers.

In November 2005, SJW moved across the street from the André House to co-locate on the new Human Services Campus, a large collaboration of agencies that serve the homeless. This year especially, as we celebrate our 20th anniversary, SJW reflects upon and recognizes the individuals and philosophical values on which the agency began. We know that many of you, the friends and supporters of the André House, are the same individuals that helped create the SJW Job Service.

This fiscal year SJW will help more than 310 homeless individuals obtain permanent employment at an average wage of \$10.82 per hour (and nearly half receiving benefits through their employer!). While the program growth

reveals a blessing, it unfortunately reveals a continued and increased need as well. To continue to strengthen our clients' odds for long-term success, SJW has created a formal Follow-Up program, through which we provide ongoing support to clients that have secured employment, to help them continue to stabilize and achieve self-sufficiency.

SJW invites you to become reacquainted, or perhaps experience for the first time, the targeted work of this agency. If you were involved or familiar with the early work of SJW, we would like to hear from you with memories, stories or photos. Please drop us a line if you would like to receive regular updates from SJW, if you can provide vignettes or information about our past history, or if you would like to visit our new facility.

Please consider celebrating with St. Joseph the Worker at its 20th Anniversary Dinner on October 10, 2008, at the Arizona Historical Society Museum in Tempe. SJW will be honoring Founding Board Member, Matt Feeney, and celebrating the work of all of our early founders including Michael Baxter, John Fitzgerald, Brother Ron Whelan and so many others that began our work in the small store front on Grand Avenue, and later inside the André House building.

The Prophet Amos Award 2008

From the pages of the Hebrew Scriptures rises a voice of unparalleled integrity, but an integrity that is not only personal, but one that challenges its world to be honest, fair and just. The voice is that of **Prophet Amos** who denounced the injustice of his time, the greed of the wealthy and the miserable condition of the poor. Speaking in God's name, he condemned those who trampled upon the needy and destroyed the poor, while begging the people to hate evil, love good and let justice prevail in all their judgments. The **Prophet Amos Award** goes to someone who shares with Catholic Charities the same passion for the needy and misunderstood as the Prophet Amos, his sense of justice and commitment to those discarded by society.

Jack and Joan Butler have been involved in the community for more than 25 years. They started at Andre House, a ministry to the homeless and poor in Phoenix, 25 years ago chopping vegetables in the back yard. Their service at Andre House includes serving supper, organizing donations, book-keeping, mentoring young volunteers, and serving as board members. Jack and Joan are involved with the St Vincent de Paul Society, Marriage Preparation, and the Ministry of Care at their parish,

Most Holy Trinity in Phoenix. Jack volunteers at St Joseph the Worker and served as the finance chairman on the Board of Directors of Rebuilding Together, formerly Christmas in April, for 7 years. They recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary and are the proud parents of 5 children and 9 grandchildren.

(Jack & Joan were nominated for this award by Dennis Flynn, Executive Director, Rebuilding Together.)


