The Summer Staff Experience

My name is Brian Buechler, and I have had the privilege of serving at André House as a member of the Summer Staff for the past two months. I am from Kansas City, Kansas, and am currently studying Mechanical Engineering at the University of Notre Dame.

I came to André House as part of a program through Notre Dame's Center for Social Concerns in which we were allowed to list our preferences of many service sites across the country. program consists of eight weeks of service that are paired with various readings concerning social justice, service, and suffering. Although I had the option of choosing a site with a less rigorous workload and closer to home, I chose André House because of its Holy Cross identity and its close proximity to the people they served.

By interacting with our guests at André House I have come to know many of them and better understand their past and present struggles. Quite often people come to me asking for a specific kind of help, and I am unable to assist them--either because we do not offer that particular service, or because we do not have adequate resources to continuously provide that service to everyone who asks. This can be difficult to accept at times. The people who come to us for help suffer so much from a number of burdens: the heat, lack of food, inadequate shelter, and the many other dangers of living on the streets.

Thankfully, the numerous discomforts our guests experience do not prevent them from showing their unique and friendly personalities. Many guests joke with me about how I appear very



excited to be working at André House because of my naturally expressionless face. In fact, one guest has given me the nickname "Smiley."

Every day, as I go about my work, our guests frequently express their gratitude for the services they receive. The gratefulness I have seen in them did not initially strike me since I had expected it. After reflecting, however, I find this thankfulness to be especially noble, since many of our guests likely face the temptation to resent God for allowing them to endure their hardships. And despite the difficulties many people face and their struggle to accept them, I frequently witness testimonies of their faith and their trust in the Lord.

In my readings this summer, I have gained a new perspective on suffering, thanks to the writings of St. Ignatius of Loyola. In his Spiritual Exercises, St. Ignatius likens following Jesus to following a king whom we must closely imitate in order to share in the king's victory. Ignatius writes that Christ the

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One Church, One Body: André House

I have always loved stained glass windows. Usually found in a church, they depict the Apostles, Christ, the Saints, or simply images that in some way draw us closer to God. They tell us a story in a way that words cannot. My mom and I were talking about these windows a while ago, and she said something that I cannot get out of my head, "Claire, you have to go inside for the story to make sense. From the outside, it's just a piece of colored glass."

As I reflect on my year of serving at André House, I find this simple story resonating in every person I have met, every bathroom I have cleaned, every hot dog I have cooked, every bleach stain on my clothes, and every moment in the ups and downs of the last 12 months. I came to André House a year ago expecting to work hard and live Christ's Gospel in a way I never had before. From the outside, André House appealed to me in every way: a chance to immerse myself in direct, glamorous, dirty, smelly service. In doing that (and much more), I unwittingly became a part of a story much bigger than me, and I think it's safe to say that I have been changed.

One of my Catholic heroes, Pope

Francis, recently said that, "The Lord wants a poor Church which evangelizes the poor." It is an ideal that speaks to my heart. Even before coming to André House, I had a hard time living with the extremes that our contains: inexplicable Church wealth juxtaposing severe poverty and suffering. It doesn't seem right that any child of God should sleep on the urine-covered street when there is an empty bed in someone's house - that anyone should be cold when there is an unused jacket hanging in someone's closet.

I do not say this to make you feel guilty about the size of your closet (although, when was the last time you cleaned out and brought your extra clothes to André House?) but to lay out the spiritual tension that I have seen André House balance out so well. André House brings together every kind of person from every walk of life in one place, with one goal, because at André House we are truly *One* Church.

André House is a poor church that loves, serves, and evangelizes the poor. I seen eight-year-olds volunteer have alongside graduate students and eighty-two year olds (you know who you are): men and women of every age and race coming together to feed, clothe, and shower our guests. More than that, I have seen them sit with our guests, share jokes, stories, and advice. I have seen so many people come together because we all have something in common: in our love for all God's children, we share a love for André House.

So I guess what I am trying to tell you is that despite how hard this year was (with or without a director), despite how many challenges the staff and I faced, despite the amount of times I wanted to cry because a guest was yelling at me for no reason, despite the powerlessness I felt

Since our past newsletter, André House has experienced many changes coupled with various challenges. The whole year was burdened with struggles that arise with a short staff. Bending and stretching became an everyday task, but God was with us. His love kept this ministry alive.

In August of 2013, André House began a new year with only three staff members. No one from the previous year chose to stay, so the core staff took the reins without any past experience. While it is possible to start off fresh, it is not ideal. The newbies have a higher learning curve, with less guidance and a short supply of teachers. Fr. Eric and Br. Richard felt and dealt with this added stress. Nevertheless, the 2013-2014 year went on without failure. God sent countless amounts of help to the André House staff. His love brought many hardworking and dedicated volunteers out of the woodwork and into the limelight, so the Gospel would endure. Our community really stepped up, filled in the holes, and helped the short staff continue offering services to those in need. For this, we are eternally arateful.

Later into the year, good news and bad news continued to hit the André House community. Staff would come, and staff would leave. Our beloved Jay Minich came in October from Chicago. He decided to stay and has since invested himself in God's hospitable touch. Then, one of the original three choose to leave for personal reasons. Back to low numbers. André House was left with Jay, Kenia and Claire. This new group held down the fort, on 11th and Jackson, with Fr. Eric and Br. Richard. Toward the end of November, however, Claire was able to convince a friend from college to join our staff. This friend, named Keenan, had been accepted into the Peace Corps but was waiting to receive a start date. Keenan was a huge blessing from God, in our time of need.

Moving forward to 2014, change in the André House staff did not end. Brother Richard has been known to say, "It is never a dull moment at André House." and he is correct. Keenan finally received a start date to travel to Namibia and teach biology. He, therefore, chose to return home at the end of February. Prior to this, however, I decided to join the picture at André House. It happened that I was visiting Notre Dame in the fall of 2013, and it was there that I learned about André House and its scarcity of staff. My experience with the homeless and poor population was very limited, but I wanted to grow in my relationship with God and all His people. There was a need on both sides of the table, with the limited staff at André House and my limited experience. God united them perfectly, and I moved to Phoenix a few days before Valentine's Day.

After my arrival, the André House community continued to stretch and bend. God's hand in all this is not human. It is divine. Fr. Eric took a sabbatical around the time of my arrival. His enduring dedication and service to the ministry of André House had provided grace and fruit for nearly six years. During Fr. Eric's sabbatical, however, Holy Cross was in the process of switching over to another year with new assignments for priests and religious. Both Fr. Eric and the staff were notified that there would be a change. Eventually, Fr. Eric received a new placement in Campus Ministry at King's College. We then received a new director, Fr. Tom Doyle, from Notre Dame. Due to Fr. Tom's commitments at Notre Dame, he cannot officially join us in

I asked him if he would please move to the end of the line and obtain a ticket at the front gate. He begrudgingly agreed, but with a sad, down-trodden look on his face. Amy looked at the man, smiled and, without asking him why he had cut in line or judging him in any way, said "he can have my ticket" and then went to the back of the line herself. I was amazed at her selfless choice in that moment.

The second example involves a guest named Jose who has struggled with poverty for years. Jose was sitting in our hallway waiting for his number to be called to enter our clothing closet. As I was walking by, he pulled me aside and asked me how donations are made to the André House. I assumed he was simply curious as to where our funding comes from and began to explain how our donors contribute. But Jose quickly stopped me and said, "I would like to make a donation. The André House has given me so much each day for so

long. I am doing better now and really want to help you guys because the work you do is so important." I was speechless and humbled by Jose's giving spirit.

St. Francis reminds us that. "It is in giving that we receive." I saw the grace and joy that Amy and Jose received by choosing to be generous even when it was not easy. I want to thank both of them along with our many other guests who have allowed me to receive a lifetime of inspiration over these past several months through their acts of kindness, generosity, and love towards one another.

As of July 26th, it was exactly one year since I moved out to Phoenix to be a part of the wonderful community here at André House. Reflecting on my years as an undergraduate student and getting involved in helping others and social justice, I would have never thought it would lead me to Phoenix, completely across the country from where I was born and raised in Boston. Every year, André House is faced with many challenges, and this past year was no exception. Of all the times we were tested and stretched to our limits, the staff all combined had the same positivity and confidence that 'we can handle it'. 'coordinator' of a soup line because I knew my volunteers would be coaching me on what to do and supporting me. One of the things about André House is that it is nothing without its volunteers. They pour time, sweat, and love into everything they do. Thanks to my Wednesday night volunteers I have not burnt down André House, yet.

The André House community is a beautiful one; it is one of the main reasons I fell in love with the establishment. However, the André House community is not just made up of volunteers and staff, but also the guests. Of course our volunteers and staff make a great community, but our quests make it even better.

Every day we have Mass or liturgy of the Word outside in the parking lot before we open. Every day cars are honking, planes are flying, which are things we cannot control. 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
